
- Mountain Lake is over 12,000 years old and is Warren County's largest, natural, glacial lake. Approximately 122 acres
- Average depth of the lake is 17 feet and a maximum depth of 38 feet
- Contains an average water volume of 67,581,497 gallons
- Unique habitat combining the Jenny Jump Mountains, the lake and the Mountain Lake Bog Natural Heritage Priority Site
- Mountain Lake was originally known as Green's Pond after surveyor Samuel Green
- The Mountain Lake area boasts a large variety of deciduous trees, such as Tulip Poplar, American Sycamore, Northern Red Oak, Shagbark Hickory, American Beech, Birch varieties, Black Walnuts, various Maple Species, Black Cherry and more!
- Wildflowers and native shrubs, such as Witchhazel, Jack in the pulpit, Mayapple, Viburnum, Wood and Rue anemones, wild geranium, moth mullein, Solomon's seal and more, create a stunning landscape & diverse habitat.
